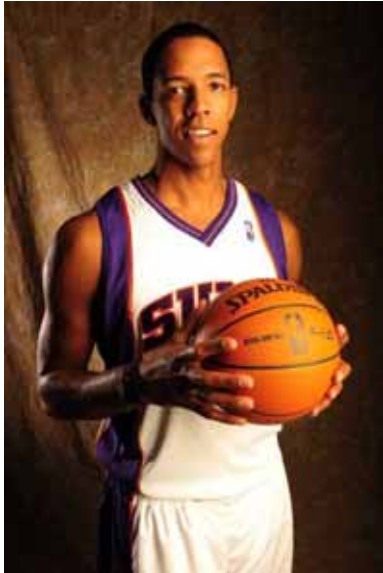

- Full name is Channing Thomas Frye
- Born in White Plains, NY, he and his family moved to New Hampshire when he was a baby and to Phoenix when he was seven.
- Father Thomas is co-founder and co-president of Education Solutions and Services, which offers office support to public and private charter schools, while mother Karen is an Emmy-winning former reporter and producer for a Phoenix TV station, and CEO of Southwest Dimensions.
- Grandfather John Mulzac was a member of the legendary Tuskegee Airmen.
- While at St. Mary's High School, he led the school to Arizona Class 5A state title with 30-3 record in 2000-01.
- He Averaged 22 ppg, 15 rpg and six blocks as a senior, earning Arizona Player of the Year honors from the *Arizona Republic* as well as *Parade Magazine* fourth team All-America designation.
- His hobbies are fishing, listening to music and reading.

**NBA**

- Signed with the Suns as a free agent on July 14, 2009, making his return to his Arizona roots in 2009-10.
- The former University of Arizona and Phoenix St. Mary's High School standout enters his fifth NBA season after a pair of two-year stints in Portland and New York.
- Drafted by the Knicks with the eighth overall pick in 2005, he missed the start of the 2008-09 season after undergoing surgery to remove bone spurs from his left ankle.

**AS A COLLEGIAN (Arizona):**

- First Team All-Pac-10 as a junior and senior
- Received the University of Arizona's Sapphire Aware, given annually to the school's outstanding senior male student-athlete
- Named 2004-05 winner of the Pac-10 Sportsmanship Award
- Named Wildcats' co-MVP and team co-captain in a vote by his teammates
- Ranked eighth in Pac-10 in scoring (15.8), fifth in rebounding (7.6), fourth in FG pct. (.554) and second in blocks (2.30)
- Named to Pac-10 All-Freshman Team
- Led Pac-10 in FG pct. as a freshman, with career-high .595 (112-205 FGA)
- Named honorable mention All-Pac-10 and Wildcats' Most Improved Player-2002-03

## Eddie Johnson

- He's very active in community service, staging various public clinics and frequently performing charity work.

**Edward (Eddie) Arnet Johnson** A sharpshooting 6'7" forward/guard, Johnson graduated from Westinghouse High School in Chicago in 1977, and then attended the University of Illinois before being selected by the Kansas City Kings in the 1981 NBA Draft. Johnson would play for the Kings, the Phoenix Suns, the Seattle SuperSonics, the Charlotte Hornets, the Indiana Pacers, the Houston Rockets, and Greek team Olympiacos (1994-1995) before retiring from basketball in 1999. Although his 19,202 points was the 22nd highest total in NBA history at the time of his retirement, Johnson was never selected to play in the All-Star game nor ever chosen for an All-NBA team. In fact, the "awards highlight" of his career occurred in 1989, when he received the NBA Sixth Man of the Year Award as a member of the Suns.

He also played for one year in the Greek League, with Olympiacos in the 1994-95 season. He became a cult favorite with the fans for his phenomenal shooting from outside the 3-point line.

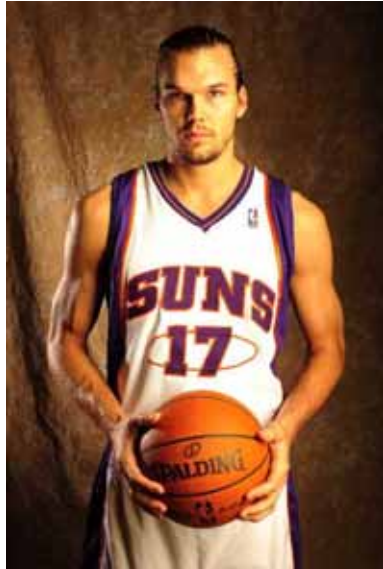
After his season overseas, he then returned to the NBA and started the 1995-96 season with the Pacers. He was traded to the Nuggets on February 20 1997 where he was quickly released. However, he signed with the Rockets for the remainder of the season and then returned to the Rockets for the next two seasons. Along with his Sixth Man of the Year Award, he is also remembered for hitting the game-winning three-pointer as time expired in a 95-92 Rockets win over the Utah Jazz in Game 4 of the 1997 Western Conference Finals.

After his playing career was over, Johnson turned to broadcasting, serving as a color commentator for the Arizona State University men's basketball team, the WNBA's Phoenix Mercury, and currently the Phoenix Suns. Johnson is also an accomplished motivational speaker, and he has recently released an instructional DVD called *Eddie Johnson's Jumpshot and Offensive Skills*.
